





- IV. Topic #1: Killeen ISD Multilingual and Biliteracy Initiatives: Dr, Crayton

Dr. Crayton introduced the team Eli Lopez, Roxanna Rosas, and Jessica Cantu. Bilingual Ed and ESL were defined, and information was given on what the district is already doing in the initiative. It was explained how they evaluated the students needing these services. Currently, the model is mostly in Spanish/English. Research has shown how they progressed in Elementary but decreased at higher levels. Because of this, the team wants to use dual language models, including Listening, Speaking, Reading and Sociocultural learning. The percentage will change of Spanish to English and will progress from PK to a 5<sup>th</sup> grade, the one-way 80/20 program. These changes are necessary to communicate with families. Informational meetings with the families were held in August 2022. In December 2022, the team met again for ESL/Bilingual information. Not many families attended, so the strategy was changed to go to campuses to meet the parents rather than hold district meetings. Now the information is online on the KISD website. It also has parent resources available for people to find information through TEA on the program.

Biliteracy gains 2021-2022 & 2022-2023, Professional Development for this program is attached.

A walkthrough was provided on how to access the website and related ESSER documents and surveys posted. The survey is in English and Spanish. Anyone can take the survey. 
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



#### **Public Health Guide Updates**

#### **Summary of Changes:**

Positive cases require 5-day isolation (students & employees)

- No symptoms= 5 days since test
- Symptoms = 5 days since they started having symptoms

#### **Public Health Guide Text:**

Once a student has been removed from campus due to a confirmed positive COVID-19 test, and before the individual is allowed back on campus, they must meet all three of the following criteria:

- At least 5 calendar days have passed since symptoms first appeared.
- At least 24 hours have passed since recovery (i.e., resolution of fever without the use of fever-reducing medications).
- The individual has improvement in symptoms (i.e., no cough, no fever)

The Bell County Public Health District recommends children that are too young to wear a mask and test positive for COVID-19 isolate for 10 days from the first date of symptoms.

#### OR

If the individual (staff or student) is diagnosed with COVID-19 and is asymptomatic (no symptoms) the individual may return to school after 5 days have passed since the date of the COVID test.







The KISD Board of Trustees met in a regular session on Tuesday, August 10, 2021, at 6:00 p.m. in the KISD Board Room.

The meeting was called to order at 6:00 p.m., Tuesday, August 10, 2021. Ms. Purser took a roll call of Board members, as indicated above, and welcomed Colonel Chad Foster and Liz Davenport. An invocation was given by Mr. Lawler, and the pledges to the U.S. flag and Texas flag were led by Mr. Mills. Ms. Purser explained that on March 16, 2020, Governor Greg Abbott granted a request by Attorney General Ken Paxton to temporarily suspend certain sections of the *Texas Open Meetings Act* to the extent necessary to allow telephonic or videoconference meetings in response to COVID-19. She noted that a quorum had been established and was in attendance. The meeting was live streaming on Cable Channel 17 and the District webpage.

Ms. Purser reviewed the procedures for Public Forum and invited anyone who had submitted a form to speak, virtually or in-person.

Sherry Miller, 602 Man O War Drive, Harker Heights, Texas, representing Killeen Classroom Teachers Association, spoke in favor of mask mandates. She referenced other Texas school districts that have implemented mask mandates against the Texas Governor's Executive Order.

PUBLIC FORUM

Jessica Reesman, 6007 Siltstone Loop, Killeen, Texas, freshman student, spoke in opposition of the school dress code, comparing excessive requirements for females versus few requirements for males. She provided a binder detailing her research and comparisons with other school districts that have more inclusive dress codes.

Rachel Bourrage, 5002 Thayer Drive, Killeen, Texas, representing Killeen Educators Association, expressed that aides are not substitute teachers and should not be used to replace teachers unless they are financially compensated. She asked that the district recognize "support personnel of the year" to reassert the value of hourly employees.

Zoila Recinos, 2600 Douglas Fir Drive, Harker Heights, Texas, speaking as a parent, pleaded for a district mask mandate to protect students under age 12 who are not yet eligible to receive the COVID vaccine.

Vernell Mack, 3405A Toledo Drive, Killeen, Texas, speaking as a grandparent and a nurse, asked the Board to do the right thing and requested that virtual learning be an option for students.

Robert Price, 2704 Blackburn Drive, Killeen, Texas, shared that his granddaughter has Aicardi Goutières syndrome and expressed his concern of the need for a mask mandate to protect the children, who are the future. He stressed the importance to invest in children's health and education.

Juan Carlos Recinos, 2600 Douglas Fir Drive, Harker Heights, Texas, speaking as a parent, pleaded for a district mask mandate and stressed the importance to have respect and empathy for each other, and to be proactive and not reactive.

Dr. Craft reviewed the return to learning plan for the 2021-2022 School Year, and discussed the update to the KISD Public Health Guide. The district is prepared to provide all students with in-person instruction. Due to the lack of state funding, KISD is unable to offer a virtual learning platform this year. Self-screening protocols remain in place, but the Texas Governor has prohibited mask mandates throughout the state under Executive Order #37. However, the eight KISD campuses on the federal property of Fort Hood must follow the required mask mandate under the Department of Defense General Order #1.

2021-2022 RETURN TO LEARNING PLAN AND KISD PUBLIC HEALTH GUIDE

Anticipated enrollment is approximately 46,000 students, and the district is encouraging and recommending face coverings and vaccinations to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. The district has hosted 16 vaccine clinics for students. Employees and students are required to report positive cases, which will be tracked and monitored internally, and reported to county and state health departments. Rapid screening tests will be available at all campuses (administered with parent consent), but positive cases are not confirmed without a PCR lab test. Cleaning protocols remain in place, and although contact tracing is no longer required, KISD has determined to continue contact tracing as part of effective mitigating efforts. The federal 10-day COVID leave expired on June 30, 2021; therefore, employees will have to use personal leave options. Students who are absent will be provided with opportunities to make up work.

As throughout the pandemic, the district is prepared to adjust as the situation changes and decisions are made on the state and federal levels. Dr. Craft consults with Dr. Janice Smith of the Bell County Health Department regularly. Mr. Williams questioned if the district could benefit from employing a medical consultant who could focus only on KISD. The Board discussed this item at length, noting the importance of personal responsibility and a team effort. This item was for information.

Ms. Purser moved ahead to agenda item #8.

Jess Neyman, Chief Human Resources Officer, presented the proposed extension of the Texas Political Subdivisions Property/Casualty Joint Self-Insurance Fund Interlocal Agreement for property and general liability coverage to be effective September 1, 2021 through August 31, 2022, and to automatically be extended for three additional years in one-year increments, unless either party provides written notification 90 days prior to renewal date. The proposal consists of a 65.8% premium increase for property insurance and a 2.9% increase in the general liability insurance rates. An increase in employee count, as well as loss exposure, account for the 2.9% increase on general liability insurance. The 15% increase in square footage from the addition of new campuses accounts for the 65.8% increase on property insurance. The cost is budgeted in the general fund. Bill Kliewer and Cindy McFall, representatives of BKCW, were present to answer questions.

Ms. Purser reviewed the procedures for Public Forum and invited anyone who had submitted a form to speak, virtually or in-person.

<u>Katie Goodwin, Fort Hood, Texas</u>, asked that safer processes for picking up and dropping off students be implemented at campuses. She reported that there was little supervision, limited parking, and no directing of traffic. (Virtually)

Sherry Miller, Harker Heights, Texas, representing Killeen Classroom Teachers Association, thanked the district for the proposed resolution of additional COVID leave and asked that the Board support it. (Virtually)

**PUBLIC FORUM** 

Aya Fubara Eneli, Belton, Texas, representing Black Ladies Advancing Qualitative and Quantitative Change, acknowledged that in-person learning is the most beneficial and asked the Board to mandate masks and implement the same protocols as last year.

<u>TaNeika Driver-Moultrie, Killeen, Texas</u>, representing the NAACP Killeen Branch, spoke in favor of mandating masks and asked the Board to have the courage to defy the governor's order prohibiting mask mandates.

<u>Dr. Don Daniels, Harker Heights, Texas,</u> chief medical officer at the Greater Killeen Community Clinic, spoke in support of mask mandates. He reviewed pediatric COVID statistics and mentioned a medical journal study that shows masks are effective.

<u>Nell Brindley, Temple, Texas</u>, asked the Board to continue to follow the governor's order and keep masks and vaccines optional.

<u>Cory Simek, Killeen, Texas</u>, spoke of the importance for children to see facial expressions and that masks are a barrier to communication. He reported that science does not prove masks are effective.

Jenny Wankmuller, Killeen, Texas, spoke against mask mandates, saying they restrict breathing and contain electrical particles that poison the body, collapses the immune system and causes bacterial pneumonia.

<u>Dr. Maggie Landes, Killeen, Texas</u>, speaking as a pediatrician and parent, spoke in support of a district chief medical officer, and asked the district to ensure the person hired understands all of the health related services needed in the district beyond COVID.

Zoila Recinos, Harker Heights, Texas, speaking as a parent, asked the district to be transparent by including rapid screener test results, in addition to PCR lab results, in the public district dashboard data.

Sandra Perez, Temple, Texas, spoke in favor of allowing parents to make health decisions for their families, sharing that masks do not work, and the COVID variants come from vaccines that do not work, and that the final variant is communism.

Kathleen Brown, Temple, Texas, shared that she had training in medical research, and asked the Board not to mandate vaccines because they were pushed out too quickly which may result in consequences later.

Larry Robison, Harker Heights, Texas, spoke against a mask mandate, reporting that he did not wear a mask throughout the pandemic, and masks cause kids to have nightmares.

Holly Teel, Killeen, Texas, speaking as a libertarian, reported that she is against a mask mandate, and according to the governor, COVID rates were declining. She expressed that masks distract kids from being able to focus.

Sooyon Jeong, Killeen, Texas, speaking as a military spouse and parent of four children in KISD, said she expected more prevention protocols since there was no mandate for masks or vaccines and no virtual learning option.

<u>Yira Barron, Killeen, Texas</u>, speaking as a parent, expressed that the district should do more to protect children by implementing masks and social distancing.

Heather Oliver, Harker Heights, Texas, speaking as an employee, reported that wearing a mask last year made her ill. She expressed that masks are not intended to be used this way and they create frustrations for students and teachers, as well as breed bacteria.

<u>Kathleen Hoelzel, Temple, Texas</u>, reviewed laws regarding personal medical and health information, and encouraged staff and parents to record conversations. She reported that COVID recovery statistics were comparable to the flu.

Jennifer Lee, Temple, Texas, recommended adding a mask mandate to the dress code as a way to work around the governor's order that prohibits mask mandates.

Irene Andrews, Nolanville, Texas, representing Safe Schools for All TX and speaking as a retired teacher, attempted to display droplet effects by shining a head flashlight on liquid she sprayed into the air. She expressed that masks are only effective if worn by everyone.

Philemon Brown, Harker Heights, Texas, representing Community Hands of Central Texas, spoke in favor of mask mandates as a moral responsibility, and reported that 52 schools districts had violated the governor's order by implementing mask mandates.

Lan Carter, Killeen, Texas, asked why KISD had not allocated \$82 million in ESSER funds that could be used for virtual learning, and requested a mask mandate be implemented.

Rachel Bourrage, Killeen, Texas, representing Killeen Educators Association, reported that a KEA survey showed employees are in favor of a mask mandate and COVID leave available to all employees, regardless of vaccination status.

Krystal Reilly, Killeen, Texas, speaking as a parent, expressed that failure to implement a mask mandate to increase the level of safety for children was negligent homicide.

<u>Tina Merker, Killeen, Texas</u>, representing Killeen Educators Association, spoke in support of a mask mandate, citing CDC recommendations and KEA survey results.

Kimberly Chunn, Fort Hood, Texas, speaking as a parent, spoke in favor of a mask mandate, sharing that her 16-year-old daughter has been battling brain cancer since she was 8 years old, and COVID would be fatal for her.

Katie Collins, Harker Heights, Texas, speaking as a parent, said her children suffered migraines when mandated to wear masks last year, and noted the importance of children seeing facial expressions.

The Board took a brief recess at 7:59 p.m. and reconvened at 8:08 p.m.

Dr. Craft reviewed the events of the first day of school, which was Monday, August 16, 2021. He discussed transportation logistics, cafeteria services, first day procedures, and campus and program enrollments. District enrollment is around 43,000 and all students receive free breakfast and lunch for the school year through the Seamless Summer Option. Ms. Maya played a video highlighting the first day of school. This item was for information.

Dr. Craft expressed appreciation for the community feedback during public forum and provided a COVID-19 update. The administration meets every morning to review district and county COVID-19 dashboards, and to consult with the Bell County Public Health District. Enrollment is anticipated to be approximately 45,000 students by Labor Day.

COVID-19 UPDATE & KISD PUBLIC HEALTH GUIDE DISCUSSION AND CONSIDERATION

The KISD Public Health Guide was updated to comply with new TEA and CDC guidelines, and notifications of positive COVID cases will be sent to the entire campus. Rapid screener tests will be available at Old Nolan Middle School and campus nurses will be trained for consistent protocol before rapid screeners will be available at each campus. As with any communicable disease, the campus nurse can quarantine students or employees that exhibit symptoms of COVID-19 or test positive. Personal protective equipment (PPE) will be available at the front desk of each campus with appropriate signage.

The Board discussed this item at length, debating the consequences of defying the governor's order that prohibits mask mandates, and the example that would set. They considered the current status of the legal battle between the governor and defiant ISDs that have implemented district mask mandates, as well as the maximum cost of fines. They discussed the feasibility of a virtual learning option for vulnerable students or in the event of a closure, and the need to address the learning gap. Ms. Wells asked for a comparison of COVID case numbers between Fort Hood campuses that are required to wear masks, and the remainder of the district that is prohibited from mandating masks. Mr. Williams made a motion to mandate masks in all schools for students and educators. Without a second, the motion died.

To maintain healthy and safe learning environments and to encourage employees to take appropriate measures to protect themselves from the COVID-19 virus, Dr. Craft proposed a legal-reviewed resolution to provide vaccinated employees an additional ten days of paid, local leave in the event they contract COVID-19 and are forced to self-quarantine. This expenditure provides a direct benefit to the district by promoting a healthy and safe workforce and workplace. To qualify, a KISD employee would willingly (1) volunteer proof of being fully vaccinated or provide a licensed physician's order articulating a medical condition that prohibits the individual from being COVID-19 vaccinated, and (2) provide proof of a COVID-19 positive lab-confirmed test result. The resolution would apply to current, active employees as of August 24, 2021 and be retroactive to the employee's first contractual reporting date following July 1, 2021. ESSER III funds will be utilized as necessary.

Ms. Wells moved to approve the proposed resolution for District Employee Additional Leave related to COVID-19 absences, as presented. Mr. Rainwater seconded the motion.

LaNeeka Dickerson, 2708 Littlewood Drive, Killeen, Texas, speaking as a parent, expressed that she was appreciative of the district-provided iPads for her three children for virtual learning, but that the replacement cost of \$950 for each device was unreasonable and asked that insurance be provided.

Anitra Hicks, 1307 Circle Tree Loop, Killeen, Texas, representing Killeen Educators Association, implored the Board to include due process for hourly employees into Board Policy.

<u>Jessica Gonzalez, 1903 Hooten Street, Killeen, Texas,</u> spoke in favor of single member districts to provide stronger community representation.

Simonette Appleton, 676 County Road 3371, Kempner, Texas, speaking as a teacher, stressed the importance of including special education lead teachers in staffing allocations. (Virtually)

Ms. Purser called a brief recess at 10:22 p.m. and the Board reconvened at 10:41 p.m. Ms. Purser called agenda item #5.

Dr. Craft reviewed that the state of Texas had expanded the eligibility of COVID-19 vaccine recipients, as of March 3, 2021, to prioritize all school employees in Phase 1b with frontline essential workers. KISD registered nurses administered COVID-19 vaccines at the Transportation building on February 13, 2021. They began administering vaccines again today at the old Nolan Middle School and will continue through March 13, from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Vaccinations will be available again after Spring Break for all employees, including substitutes. Vaccines and supplies are being provided by Bell County Health Department.

Dr. Craft reviewed that the Texas Governor issued Executive Order GA-34 on March 2, 2021, effective March 10, 2021, to lift pandemic related mandates, including the wearing of face coverings. Subsequently, the Texas Education Agency released an update on March 3, 2021, to their Public Health Planning Guidance, which allows that school boards may determine whether or not to adjust pandemic related district mandates currently in place. The district administration advises against making changes at this time to the KISD Public Health Guide and to continue the current mandates, in order to avoid triggering high numbers of student and staff self-quarantine due to close contact, or campus closures, which would jeopardize senior graduations, prom, and other student events. Failure to comply with the mask mandate is treated as a dress code violation. This was an information item.

KISD was closed for ten instructional days due to the winter storm emergency during the month of February 2021. To address the student learning gaps from missed instructional time, the administration was asked at the February 23, 2021 Regular meeting, to bring back a consideration on the feasibility of extending the school day by 30 minutes each day for the remainder of the current school year. Dr. Craft reviewed several programs and schedules that would be affected, noting the logistical challenges and additional costs.

The KISD Early College High School (ECHS) is an innovative high school that provides students with an opportunity to earn a high school diploma and up to 60 college credit hours. It provides academic and social support services; such as Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID), PATH, mandatory tutoring, and DuFour Philosophy, to help students succeed and increase college readiness. KISD Early College High School was established in 2015 and graduated the inaugural class in May of 2019. Principal Kathleen Burke, and Assistant Principal Joe Gonzalez, presented an overview of the 2020-2021 School Year, noting the challenges of the pandemic. The campus population was 1006 students, but 57.9% were remote learners. As students are enrolled in a full-time schedule of college classes, in addition to their high school classes, they take some classes during summer to balance the workload.

Two senior students, La'Quaje' Bradley and Danica Komlofske, shared their experiences through the program, noting the sacrifices, the opportunities, and the personal growth. They related that Principal Burke's caring leadership has created a loving environment at ECHS. The Board praised the students and staff, and Dr. Craft noted how the ECHS Program has flourished since its beginning.

Dr. Craft reviewed the proposed updates to the Public Health Guide and discussed the return to in-person learning for the 2021-2022 School Year. The KISD Dashboard, which tracks positive COVID-19 cases, has a low number of views and will be discontinued. The COVID-19 Notification Call Data Message Tracking revealed that notifications by phone are ineffective, as they are largely unanswered or ignored, and will therefore be discontinued. Notifications by email will continue to be utilized. KISD has offered vaccinations to all employees and plans to have parent consent forms available to students over the summer to assist in facilitating students receiving vaccinations administered by their health care providers. Face coverings would no longer be required as of June 1, 2021, and the district anticipates a more traditional school year with no capacity restrictions for 2021-2022. Cleaning protocols will continue, and the additional 100 custodian allocations added in the current school year remain for the following school year. Ms. Jones noted the benefits of good habits that have been formed for consistent handwashing and sanitizing. This item will be brought back for consideration at the May 25 Regular meeting.

**PUBLIC FORUM** 

KEYS INSIDE STUDENT DEVELOPMENT: KISD ARCHERY PROGRAM AT REECES CREEK ES

This meeting spotlighted the Archery Program at Reeces Creek Elementary School, which began in Spring 2014 with a grant from the KISD Education Foundation. Coaches Sharon Jackson and HaJuania Pollard, under the direct support of principal, Dr. Sara Watson, reviewed how the program has grown in size and skill, competing at the Texas National Archery in Schools (TNAS) Qualifier, State, and National tournaments. Three 5th-grade honor roll student archers, Jaylon Butler, Jeralyn Russell, and Imoni Pitchford, shared their personal testimonies of participating in the program, and learning life skills of discipline, safety, and teamwork. The group answered questions of the Board.

Dr. Craft reviewed that the KISD Public Health Guide was brought to the May 18, 2021 Board Workshop for discussion of the return to in-person learning guidelines for the 2021-2022 School Year, COVID-19 mitigation efforts, and COVID-19 notification call data message tracking. This item was brought back with information on the Texas Governor's Executive Order GA-36, relating to the prohibition of governmental entities and officials from mandating face coverings or restricting activities in response to COVID-19, issued on the evening of May 18, 2021, and effective on June 4, 2021.

Dr. Craft reviewed that face coverings would be required at the upcoming graduations, but would be optional across the district beginning on June 1, 2021. The district will continue to monitor the situation and adjust as necessary. The district is working with Curative to provide vaccinations at Leo Buckley Stadium and will provide vaccination sites in the summer for students, age 12 and up, with vaccinations administered by Baylor Scott & White health care providers. This item was for information.

Angenet Wilkerson, Director for Community Relations, reviewed that KISD and the City of Killeen proposed to share facilities for the benefit of both organizations, as well as community members. The Memorandum of Agreement for Shared Usage of Facilities solidifies the engagement and responsibilities of each party, and will expire on December 31, 2024, unless terminated with written notice by either party. Mr. Rainwater moved to approve the proposed Memorandum of Agreement with the City of Killeen for the Shared Usage of Facilities, as presented, and authorize the Superintendent to execute the agreement. Mr. Lawler seconded the motion, which carried, 7-0.
