- Appearing on many popular television networks and at many events.
- Removing Pluto from the official list of planets.
- Educating the American public on Earth and space science topics.
- Worked on a board to examine policies regarding aerospace and space exploration in the US

BORN

December 23, 1867 in Louisiana

KINDNESS THROUGH EMPOWERMENT AND BUSINESS

- Commitment to uplifting African
 American women by providing
 employment opportunities in her
 hair care business.
- Used her wealth to support social causes, donated generously to organizations that helped African American communities, including funding scholarships and supporting civil right groups.
- Walker's business empire served as a source of empowerment, promoting self -love and solidarity.

DIED

May 25, 1919 in Irvington, New York

HER BUSINESS

- Created a very successful scalp treatment for black women that completely changed the black hair care industry
- Opened a beauty school and factory for black hair care products
- Known for her positive impact on her employees and her community

BORN

December 13, 1903 in Norfolk, Virgina

KINDNESS THROUGH SERVICE AND COLLECTION ACTION

- Empowering others, particularly young people, to find their vocies and take leadership roles in the civil rights movement.
- Her commitment to challenging systemic racism and fighting for social and political equality for all.
- Known for humility and for practicing the kind of kindness that meant listening to the needs and concerns of others, particularly those who were often overlooked in larger movements.

DIED

December 13, 1986 in New York, New York

HER WORK

- She worked for four very large social activism organizations throughout her career.
- This included being a part of racial equity councils in Congress and participating in the famous 1961 Freedom Rides.

frederick douglass

BORN

1818 in Talbot County,
Maryland

KINDNESS THROUGH ADVOCACY AND FREEDOM

- His lifelong fight for the abolition of slavery and his tireless work to promote civil rights.
- Dedicated his life to educating others, believing that knowledge was the key to freedom and equality. His kindness was shown in his selfless desire to uplift others through education.
- Promoted the idea of kindness through understanding and tolerance, urging everyone to come together in the fight for justice and equality.

DIED


February 20, 1895 in Washington, D.C.

- He escaped slavery and later became an abolitionist leader
- He authored multiple auto biographies and his own abolitionist newsletter
